At the end of the day we need to fix the problem, once and for all. We need to stop the cycle of psychopathic domination. To accomplish this goal what is needed is the creation, support, and maintenance of a new type of human being and a social order in which psychopaths cannot function.

We need human being with these characteristics.

A human being who is not a psychopath.

A human being who is not a slave.

A human being whose primary cultural programming creates a perspective where the benefit of the people in the society is the primary goal of any and all social institutions whether those institutions are religion, government, business, or whatever.

A human being whose first question upon being presented with an event or information will be "How will this support or further the goal of benefiting the people in our social order?"

A human being who is at the core a social animal whose personal well-being is integrated with the well-being of all other human beings in the society. A human being who cannot be bribed, intimidated, threatened, or coerced into incorrect behavior.

A human being who can sustain the ethical and moral direction of their society because they are supported by others in their society with the same perspective.

The way in which creation of these type of people and the associated social order will eliminate psychopaths from the population.

Briefly, Psychopaths are "**intraspecies predators who use charm, manipulation, intimidation, and violence to control others and to satisfy their own selfish needs. Lacking in conscience and in feelings for others, they take what they want and do as they please, violating social norms and expectations without guilt or remorse**" –Emeritus Professor Robert Hare

Basic characteristics of psychopaths.

A psychopath has no concern for the feelings of others and a complete disregard for any sense of social obligation.

They seem egocentric and lack insight of any sense of responsibility or consequence.

Their emotions are thought to be superficial and shallow, if they exist at all.

They are considered callous, manipulative, and incapable of forming lasting relationships, let alone showing any kind of meaningful love.

They typically never perform any action unless they determine it can be beneficial for themselves.

They use charm, manipulation, intimidation, and violence to control others.

How does a society identify, neutralize, and ultimately eliminate these type of people from the social order?

Waiting until this type of person breaks the law is one way. However, if the person is in the position to control the laws that are being made then your solution won't work.

The SSAF solution is to create a tightly knit social order where all the citizens function in a manner that will not allow psychopathic behavior to go undetected or unaddressed at the level of individual interaction as well as the level of the social order. This means that understanding of what psychopaths are and techniques for identifying them are part of the standard education of the individual in the new social order. In addition, the establishment and maintenance of positive and mutually beneficial interpersonal relationships is a priority for everyone in the society. Another critical element is the ability of the individual to understand techniques of manipulation which may be used against them and how to investigate and analyze events and information in order to detect deceitful behavior. Finally, the majority of the population must be prepared to act against psychopathic behavior immediately upon detection. This is not about vigilantism. This is about enforcing the social norms. For example, should a individual seek to dominate another individual through verbal or physical threats. All citizens witness to such an event will immediately take action to warn the offender to stop their behavior immediately or be subject to arrest by the parties present. If the person will not change their behavior or repeats the behavior, they are arrested on the spot by other citizens and delivered to the police.

Even in this simple example the conditions for this to work become evident. The citizens must have the background and training to recognize and document incorrect behavior. The citizens must be empowered by the social order to function in this capacity. The citizens must have the background, training, and means to effect an arrest. This process must be resistant or immune to a psychopath using it to oppress other people. The way this is done is through trust, strong and effective interpersonal relationships, analytical thinking, and well understood social behavioral parameters.

We certainly wouldn't expect the average American citizen to be able to function in this capacity. They don't have the background, training, trust, interpersonal integrity, or means to operate in this fashion. Which is why American society is rife with psychopaths at all levels of society. The average American is nothing but prey to a psychopath. Easily manipulated by lies, intimidation, sexual favors, or bribes.

Strong tight knit communities are resistant to psychopaths at the individual level. The problem is that so far, the "strength" of these communities is based on exclusive, racist, oppressive, enslaving, religious ideologies and social orders. Also, the hierarchical nature of these societies make infiltration by psychopaths inevitable.

We need to take the strength and experience of these examples and create a new tightly knit society but without the problems of the old ones. We want trust and cooperative behavior to be inherent characteristics but with a population that sees hierarchy as an administrative structure only. A population that will reject completely the concept of being "governed" by anyone. A population which will cooperate with the administrative machinery and not become subordinate to it. This type of society cannot be hijacked by psychopaths. The first time a psychopath gained a position in the administrative system and tried to lie, cheat, steal, dominate others, etc. they would be rebuffed and warned and their behavior reported to the police. The second time they would be arrested and if their behavior caused injury or damage to citizens, the chances are they wouldn't live to see the break of day. Oh well. The average citizen wouldn't put up with this type of behavior. If a psychopath maneuvered itself into a position where they could "legally" injure a citizen, instead of standing there helplessly, the citizen would respond immediately, probably killing the psychopath. Again, you have to have a tightly knit system to do this. The citizen, understanding that if they cannot prove the psychopath had injured them, would take the hit for the society by going to jail or even to execution with no

fuss and no complaint, knowing that they had eliminated a threat to the social order. But the example set would be a warning to all psychopaths: injure these people and you will be destroyed.

Eventually very sophisticated techniques would have to be developed to identify psychopaths. Especially during the development of children. Psychopaths are very clever inherently, but at a very young age their behavior betrays them much more readily. This area would have to be examined much more carefully in order to come up with an effective method for identifying psychopathy in children.
